## THE LAST WORD

If you're going to use the sword you should know at least the fundamentals of how to wield it. O-Sensei told me to study how to handle the sword both before and after drawing it from the scabbard. So in that sense Iai was to be my training in what to do before drawing the blade. Your frame of mind and preparation before drawing the blade is very important in Iai, as are the angle and orientation of the blade's cutting edge. These things have to be just right because you're going to use the sword to actually cut. You can't understand such things using only a wooden sword. Practicing Iai gives you a good feel for how to orient the edge of the blade and adjust your power. --Chiba Kazuo, Aikido Journal.
