The Iaido Shinkyu Shinsa for 3rd Dan and below will also be held Sunday, February 24, 2002. The Shinsa will be held at 3:00pm following the Iaido Seitei Review Seminar from 1:00pm. Location: Renton Community Center, 1715 Maple Valley Hwy, Renton, WA All applicants must be a 2002 AUSKF member and be a current 2002 PNKF member. The Due date is: February 10, 2002. No applications will be accepted after this date. Shinsa cancellations must be given by February 17, 2000. Cancellations after this date will have only the certificate fees returned. Please note that if an applicant does not pass the examination, the certificate fee will be returned. If an applicant does not attend the Shinsa without proper notification, the Shinsa fee is forfeited, and only the certificate fee is returned.

KENDO WORLD MAGAZINE An excellent new English-language journal has burst upon the scene with a spectacular inaugural issue. Kendo World - Crossing Swords and Borders is edited and published in Japan and printed in Auckland, New Zealand. This first issue leads off with a message from President of the All Japan Kendo Federation, Takeyasu Yoshimitsu Sensei. Major articles include "The History of Bogu" by

Nakamura Tamio, "Hokkai-join and Reflections on the Meaning of Mokuso" by Inoue Yoshihiko, and "Achilles Tendon Injuries in Kendo" (The Kendo Clinic) by Arima Saburo MD. Additionally, there are articles on sword polishing, Kendo breathing, doping, visiting Japan, and reports on the Kitamoto Summer Camp, the All-Japan Championships, the Japanese Academy of Budo, Iaido, Jodo, and Naginata, and a survey on whether Kendo should be in the Olympics. To kick off the "Tradition and Transmission" series, there's an in-depth look at the Tenshin Shoden Katori Shintoryu. By special arrangement with the All Japan Kendo Federation, Kendo World filmed the recent All Japan Kendo Championships, footage of which is included on a bonus CD-ROM with the first issue, including profiles of all the players (thanks to Kendo Jidai magazine, with whom Kendo World is affiliated), and the complete results. Also included in the CD-ROM are video clips of the two new All Japan Kendo Federation Iaido kata, to complement the written article detailing them. It is the first time any Kendo magazine has included a CD-ROM right along with the issue. Coming up in Issue 2 for April/May 2002 will be a main feature on Kendo ranks or gradings, including a personal perspective of the process of taking 7th Dan by our own Jeff Marsten Sensei. Other articles will include part 1 of a 2-part in-depth look at the latest Japanese research into Miyamoto Musashi, and Inoue Sensei looks the Kendo Kata. The Kendo Clinic will focus on back pain, "Tradition and Transmission" part 2 will look at the Maniwa Nen Ryu, and there will be features on great swordsmen and some of their sayings, bringing a live blade into Japan, making scabbards, and much more.
