PASSAGE

Lifelong kenshi and active supporter of the PNKF Takeo Ted Imanishi passed away August 9, 2003 after a protracted, noble, and exemplary battle with cancer. Ted Imanishi was born in Seattle November 20, 1923. He was most active in Kendo in the pre-War period, and often shared stories from that era. His father, Umajiro Imanishi, head instructor at Seattle Kendo Kai, was arrested by the F.B.I. December 8, 1941 for the crime of being an important community leader in the form of a Kendo teacher, and spent the War in a Federal penitentiary. By mid-1942 the rest of the family had been sent to Camp Minidoka, from which Ted Imanishi was drafted in 1944 and served in a three-man machine gun crew in "Dog" Company of the legendary 442nd Regimental Combat Team, the most decorated unit in American military history. Following the War, he completed apprenticeship as a carpenter, built a business as a cabinetmaker, and eventually became a highly respected general contractor famous for his immaculate craftsmanship and integrity. On October 7, 1951 he married Toshiko Okada. Three of their five children, Teresa, Douglas and Daryl, have become prominent kenshi in the PNKF. In addition there are also two more daughters, Arlene and Kathleen. In 1984 we held the Third United States Kendo Championships in Seattle. Under the taikai chairmanship of David Yotsuuye, the Fund Raising Committee was Yosh Tanabe, Kiyoshi Yasui, and Ted Imanishi. Ted involved his brother Yosh Imanishi in the fund raising activity as well, and this Committee raised many thousands of dollars for a great taikai which finished in the black, and left the Federation a legacy. Ted Imanishi attended Seattle Kendo Kai practice every Sunday, and always went to every major regional taikai. Over the years, he was consistently available for help and support in Kendo activities. We miss him, and our heartfelt condolences go to his wife Toshiko, his sister Hats, children, grandchildren, and all the family.
