Naked Blade: A Manual of Samurai Swordsmanship, by Obata Toshishiro. Dragon Books, 1986. (available from Dragon Books, P.O. Box 6039, Thousand Oaks, CA 91359, \$8.50 + \$1.50 postage and handling; our copy purchased at Uwajimaya in Seattle) This is an introduction to Toyama Ryu Batto Jutsu which has added interest for us in WSKF as the author is a student of Nakamura Taizaburo Sensei, who recently visited us and taught us during the Cherry Blossom Festival. Naked Blade can therefore serve as an English language supplement to the more definitive tape and other study materials Nakamura Sensei so kindly left with us, although it does not go into the Nakamura Ryu but is limited to just the Toyama Ryu. As an added surprise bonus, on pages 13 through 19 there is a very beautiful essay on the Japanese sword by Kobayashi Yasuhiro Tō-Shō, who in fact turns out to be none other than our own Konno Sensei's sword-polishing teacher! Illustrated with many photographs and drawings. NOTE: "BUNBU KENBI" meaning "proficient in both the literary and the martial" will be the department for occasional notes on study materials.
