THE LAST WORD

In his later years, Munenori compiled all of his theories on swordsmanship in a book, Yagyu-ke Hyoho-Kaden-sho (Book of Swordsmanship for the Posterity of the Yagyu), which focused on mental control during combat rather than the mechanics of swordsmanship. The problem of mental control seems to have been a matter of ultimate importance to Munenori. In this book, we can catch a glimpse of Takuan's great influence upon Munenori from the many words related to Zen philosophy which are used.
