OMORI RYU IAIDO

Ever wondered why Iaido is practiced from Seiza? Or why Kenshi should study Iai at all? THE LAST WORD

The formal sitting position itself is useful. The scabbard must be properly controlled in the belt or the tip will hit the floor. The student's back can easily be kept straight since only the hip joint is involved in letting it bend. The draw and cut (nuki tsuke) is simplified with only one possible orientation of the hips. Spiritually, the student begins and finishes in the most humble position possible, one that is close to the floor. The position is vulnerable to attack and therefore cannot be aggressive as the raised knee or standing techniques. Moving up to a standing position from seiza requires great leg strength, giving the student a good root into the ground. Sitting solidly in seiza allows the student to know what that root should feel like while standing. --Kim Taylor, "The Omori Ryu: A History and Explanation," JOURNAL OF ASIAN MARTIAL ARTS.
