PASSAGE

A few more notes on Hashimoto Ryutaro.

His actual rank at the time of his death on July 1, 2006 was Kendo Renshi 6th Dan. The All Japan Kendo Federation had granted him Renshi while he was still 5th Dan, and subsequently in November 2005 he passed the 6th Dan shinsa.

News of Hashimoto Sensei's passing came as a particularly heavy blow to his friends in Nepal. He was heading the celebration committee in Japan and slated as the guest of honor for the Golden Jubilee Celebration of Nepal-Japan Diplomatic Ties to be held in September. Hashimoto Sensei started pouring funds into Nepal ever since his first visit to that country when he was a member of the Japanese Diet, and continued to do so later as Finance Minister and then Prime Minister of Japan.

The impetus stemmed from a group of doctors inviting him to his first visit to the Kanti Children's Hospital in 1984. "He was staying at Hotel Yak & Yeti. Since so much was being done by Japan for the Teaching Hospital, we met him and asked if anything could be done for Kanti. He visited the hospital and almost broke down in tears seeing the pitiful state it was in," said pediatrician Dr. Manindra Raj Baral, who was then the hospital's director and is now its chairman. Following that, he channeled huge amounts of money to upgrade the Children's Hospital's infrastructure, and always made it a point to visit the hospital and deliver private donations which he had collected. "Every time he came, he brought along something. He even sent the hospital the gifts received by his children during their marriage," Dr. Baral said.

In addition, Hashimoto Sensei initiated the Kathmandu/Matsumoto sister city relationship, and this resulted in the building of the multi-purpose Martial Art Center in Nayabazaar.
