So from 10:00 to 11:30am everyone had Kendo keiko, and from 11:30am to 2:00pm a fabulous luncheon was served to all the kenshi and guests at the Tacoma Kendo and Iaido Club Dojo in the South Park Community Center.

Dozens of ken-yu old and new enjoyed a vigorous keiko with the birthday boy and with each other. Ogushi Yasuhiro Sensei traveled all the way from Japan especially for the occasion and brought a gift of a special gold costume, including a large gold hat, to be worn specifically for the Beiju. Omoto Sensei looked wonderful, and radiantly happy, dressed in gold from head to toe and surrounded by people who love him dearly.

YASUI SENSEI 90th BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

Thursday September 28 was Kiyoshi Yasui Sensei's 90th birthday. Seattle Kendo Kai presented him with a commemorative plaque for his lifetime of contributing to Kendo at Sunday's practice, October 1.

Born in Seattle in 1916, he was sent to Japan for school. Since his return in the mid-1930's he has been one of the most loyal and helpful members of Seattle Kendo Kai, continuously and faithfully active except when World War II interrupted Kendo in this region. Along with Umajiro Imanishi Sensei and Kaz Shoji Sensei it was Yasui Sensei who was instrumental in reviving Seattle Kendo Kai in the 1960's and since Imanishi Sensei withdrew out of medical necessity, Yasui Sensei has been the Dojo's Senior Instructor.

SHIONKAI

A solemn and joyous ShiOnKai (Shi=Master, On=Gratitude, Kai=Gathering) was hosted by Cascade Kendo Kai on Saturday September 30 at Ivar's Salmon House to honor Paul Kurose Sensei, Pat Yoshitsugu Murosako Sensei, Rod Nobuto Omoto Sensei, and Kiyoshi Yasui Sensei as the living transmission of all our most prized values in the PNKF.

The master of ceremonies, Gary Imanishi Sensei, also took the opportunity to thank the many, many people both prominent and behind-the scenes, living and deceased, whose sacrifice and constant support have made PNKF Kendo possible over the decades. Mothers were particularly singled out for praise and profound thanks. An especially moving introduction was given to the New Horizons Kendo Club, a group of men and women in their 70's and 80's who in the last few years have all begun practicing Kendo for the first time.

The ShiOnKai was also saluted with wonderful remarks by Kazuo Tanaka, the Honorable Consul General of Japan; Ron Chew, Executive Director of the Wing Luke Museum; Dale Watanabe, Commander of the Nisei Veterans Committee; and Diane Mortenson, Community Center Coordinator, Community Center at Mercerview, City of Mercer Island Parks and Recreation.

The banquet room was lavishly decorated for the event with lovely flowers and delicious treats,

and with very large supergraphics of rare old historic photographs of area Kendo scenes. Each guest was also seated at a placemat consisting of one of these photos, and at the end was presented with a very valuable souvenir book containing all of the photographs.
