PASSAGE On Friday, August 3, 2007, a great, noble, and much-loved kenshi bravely launched forth on the adventure that follows upon our life. Ted Davis, Iaido Renshi 7th Dan, Kendo 5th Dan, President of the Canadian Iaido Association, founder and head instructor of the University of Victoria Kendo Club, and a Director of the British Columbia Kendo Federation, died at the age of 60 after having calmly, serenely and resolutely fought a brutally short and cruel battle with B-lymphocyte non-Hodgkin's lymphoma of the spine, an extremely virulent and aggressive form of cancer. Born November 17, 1946 in Oregon, gentle and peace-affirming Davis Sensei had been intensely interested in ecology and environmental issues from childhood, loving the mountains, rock climbing, bird watching, sailing, kayaking, tree planting, and researching reptiles and amphibians. He received a bachelor of science from Portland State University in 1968. He lived in Japan for two years studying Japanese culture, language, and martial arts. In 1986 he went to the University of Victoria, where he established the city's only Kendo Club, and where he also earned a master of science and in 1996 completed a Ph.D., both on salamanders of Vancouver Island. He continued at the University as post-doc researcher, teacher of biology, and, of course, Kendo and Iaido sensei. Our deepest condolences go to his family, especially his wife Colleen Kasting, his daughter Logan, Logan's mother Jeannine, and his sister Sue. Memorial service August 18, 4:30pm, Alix Gooldin Hall, corner of Quadra and Pandora, Victoria, BC, with potluck following. THE LAST WORD The purpose of this study was to determine whether a reduction in exercise efficiency occurs with aging, whether exercise efficiency differs in men versus women, and whether increases in exercise capacity from several months of supervised exercise training would be associated with improvements in exercise efficiency. After baseline testing, all subjects underwent a six-month supervised training program. The exercise program consisted of walking/jogging, bicycling, and stretching, each for 30 min, for a total of 90 min per session, three times per week. What was new and unexpected in our study was the disproportionately greater response to training in the elderly subjects (ages 65-79), with complete reversal of age-related decrements in oxygen debt, recovery, and exercise efficiency. After training, the elderly subjects showed a lower oxygen debt, lower recovery, and higher efficiency than the untrained young (ages 20-33). In general, the reversibility of these parameters with training suggests that a significant portion of the changes that are seen with aging may in fact be due to lower fitness levels in the sedentary elderly as compared to the sedentary young. With only moderate changes in cardiorespiratory fitness, the elderly appear to achieve greater relative gains in exercise efficiency and other exercise-responsive aerobic parameters compared to the young. --J.
